Mission Statement

The New York State Commission for the Blind (NYSCB) empowers individuals who are legally blind, deaf-blind, or low-vision to lead independent, fulfilling lives through comprehensive vocational counseling, advocacy, rehabilitation training and employment services. By enhancing their employability, maximizing independence, and nurturing personal and professional growth, the NYSCB enables individuals to secure and maintain meaningful work in a competitive integrated employment setting.

About Us

The NYSCB is one of New York State's two Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) agencies, dedicated to empowering individuals of all ages to acquire new job skills or sustain their current employment. The other VR agency is ACCES-VR, which is part of the NYS Education Department. Both agencies are federally funded and state-operated.

NYSCB was established by law in 1913 to maintain a "census of the blind" in New York State and to help individuals who are legally blind find suitable employment. NYSCB was also charged with researching the causes of blindness and advancing blindness prevention.

In 1920, the state/federal partnership in vocational rehabilitation (VR) was created under the National Vocational Rehabilitation Act. This law created a system of state VR agencies and established federal funding of VR services. In addition, the law allows for separation of state VR agencies into those that serve individuals who are legally blind and those

that provide services to all other disabled groups.

Service Populations

NYSCB serves legally-blind New Yorkers from birth to end-of-life. The NYSCB programs serve children, transition-aged youth (14-21), adults, and older blind (over 55). We serve individuals with blindness as well as other disabilities including people with physical, sensory and emotional disabilities. We also serve people with medical complications resulting in their blindness including diabetes.

Partnership for Inclusive Internships

Not your grandmother's PII

- □ Developed by AHRC NYC to foster inclusive hiring within New York City and State government through an inclusive internship program.
- ☐ In her 2023 State of the State address, Governor Hochul made the commitment to bring the program to State agencies.
- □ Working on the NYS Dept. of Labor and Chief Disability Office team, the statewide Inclusive Internship Coordinator began in April 2024 to:
 - Develop internship opportunities within State agencies
 - Create a pipeline of qualified interns with disabilities who have an open case with Acces-VR or NYS Commission for the Blind.
 - Conduct the placement, follow-up and evaluation of each internship experience
- ☐ Project goals include:
 - Provide critical experience for people with disabilities seeking to enter the workforce
 - Stable, long-term employment for people with disabilities in the NYS workforce
 - Advance the State's effort to become a model employer



Partnership for Inclusive Internships

- ☐ Internships can be developed around any:
 - Meaningful need
 - Project
 - In demand position
- ☐ Acces-VR or NYS Commission for the Blind pays the intern via an approved vendor
- ☐ Internship are generally 320 hours long over 3-4 months

□ DD-214 (VETERANS)
VA Disability Rating Document (VETERANS)
☐ (or) Purple Heart documentation (VETERANS)
☐ VA determination Letter showing 10% or more of total disability will
substitute for the DPM-60(VETERANS)
Restoration of Honor Act determination (VETERANS)

**Applications take 4-6 weeks for a final determination to be made.
